We are going to work towards writing a postcard in role as Little Phil who will be writing to a friend to tell them all about what happened at the beach that day.

To help us to do this, you need to read all of the sentences below with an adult. They're not in chronological order at the moment so does the story make sense? Have a think about the language Phil is using – it's **informal (chatty)** language because he is writing to someone that he knows well.

Now cut out sentences and put them in the correct order. Make sure you you keep checking that you are putting them in **chronological order**! You could ask yourself – is this in the beginning, middle or end of the story? Don't stick anything down until you are sure!

<u>Bonus challenges:</u> Can you find some examples of informal (chatty) language? e.g. you'll never guess what... Can you add a sentence of your own to give some more details about the day?
